Course Number EGL-266-01 **Course Description** This course provides an introduction to the major themes and concerns of twentieth- and twenty-first century African American women writers. We begin in the 18thcentury and move quickly to the 20thand 21st. We will examine the ways in which black womanhood is characterized through intersecting categories of race, gender, class, sexuality, and empire. We will explore how selected authors wrestle with stereotypical images of African American women, examine the connections between black womanhood, community, and empire, and discuss the benefits and limitations of the concept of black women's writing.
